Cities' Identity: The Innovative Dialogue Between Art and Architecture



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Introduction

The identity of a city is the result of a dynamic and layered process in which art and architecture play a fundamental role. Over the centuries, cities have evolved as living organisms, adapting to the social, economic, and cultural needs of their communities. This development has given rise to unique urban landscapes, where art and architecture continuously interact, reflecting values, aspirations, and collective memories. This volume brings together selected studies from the 8th edition of conference *Cities' Identity through Architecture and Arts (CITAA 2024—University of Cagliari, Sardinia, Italy—17–19 September)*, which gathered experts in architecture, urban planning, heritage conservation, and visual arts. The contributions stem from academic research and provide a critical reflection on how art and architecture can collaborate to define urban identity. The essays range from theoretical analyses to case studies, demonstrating how their interaction can offer new solutions to contemporary urban challenges.

The relationship between art and architecture takes multiple forms, from monuments and public sculptures that narrate a community's history and ideologies to buildings incorporating artistic elements to express identity and belonging. Architecture often draws inspiration from visual arts, while street art and other forms of urban art contribute to transforming public spaces. Urban identity thus emerges as a collective experience, shaped by the interplay between historical heritage and innovation.

A significant example is the city of Gibellina in Sicily, which was destroyed by an earthquake in 1968 and rebuilt through the contributions of artists and architects. The city has become an open-air museum, merging art and architecture to create a space that serves both as a place of memory and as a platform for cultural innovation. Its reconstruction has presented challenges and opportunities, which are analyzed in the essays included in this volume.

Through an interdisciplinary approach, this volume explores the role of art and architecture as tools for narrating and transforming urban space. It examines their impact on urban identity and studies the artistic and architectural movements that have influenced urban development. It investigates emblematic case studies where the interaction between these disciplines has contributed to shaping the city and defining its image in collective memory.
